THREE POWERFUL DAYS...that's what Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday are. Financial Update - March 2012

"It is our hope that following through on this plan will reduce the 'balloon' payment at that time to a manageable amount." Total income for the period from July 1, 2011 through February 29, 2012 was \$245,016 vs. a budget of \$231,021 and total expenses were \$207,739 vs. a budget of \$204,056. While these appear to be outstanding results to-date, showing a surplus of \$37,278, nearly the entire surplus was used to service the parish's debt to the Knights of Columbus. The principal payments for this period totaled \$31,988, including \$15,000 from the 2011 Lawn party leaving a net surplus of \$5,290. It should be noted that the overrun of expenses vs. budget was entirely due to the emergency maintenance work needed on the stone work of the church, and to the repair of the church sound system.

In October of 2008 the parish borrowed \$275,000 to cover the remaining balance on the new heating system, and to restore the badly deteriorating bell tower. The loan balance as of this writing is \$99,157.

The plan to repay the balance of the loan includes applying all of the proceeds from the remaining two Summer Festivals, while continuing to make the regular monthly payments. It is our hope that following through on this plan will reduce the "balloon" payment at that time to a manageable amount. That balloon payment is due on September 1, 2013.

In the area of maintenance projects, this spring we will finally finish the road repair work in the cemetery, repair the walkways around the church and the rectory, and complete the replacement of the rectory windows.



Family Clothing Sale at St. Ann


St. Ann Parish will hold a clothing sale on Saturday, May 5th from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. in the Family Center.

Trip To Italy Planned to 2012 Diaconate Ordination in Rome

Many of you may remember Michael Pierz, the seminarian who spent last summer with us at ST. Vincent de Paul, St. Patrick and St. Ann's. Michael is completing his schooling in Rome this October 4th and we have been invited to witness his move one step further in his journey towards priesthood.

A trip has been organized for us to travel to Italy this October 1-12 to be a part of this ceremony and to also see the sites of Rome and Umbria as well. This is a 12 day-10 night trip and the cost is \$2,869 including transportation to and from the church, 2 meals a day .We'll spend 3 days in Rome and then travel through the Umbrian countryside stopping at Assisi, Siena, Perugia, Orvieto, Spello, Spoletto and other small countryside towns. An informational meeting will take place on April 28th, at 7 p.m., at St. Ann Family Center. Those interested in this trip are welcome and encouraged to attend. Postures and Gestures of the Liturgy

The following is another in the continuing series from The Spiritual Life Committee regarding the whys and wherefores of our faith, we hope you will find them helpful in sharing our faith with the young people in your life as well as with your friends of other faiths.

During the celebration of Mass and other devotional liturgies we assume various postures and use various gestures that are backed by tradition, symbolism and meaning. Their understanding leads to a fuller and richer experience of worship and participation.



The Procession

The first posture we encounter when attending the sacred liturgy is the procession. This procession symbolizes the Pilgrim Church. The presiding priest, deacons, ministers, servers and the book of the Gospels in processing their way to the altar give meaning to the journey toward Heaven of the body of believers present in the pews. During the Mass the gifts of bread and wine are also brought in procession to the altar and this is followed by the procession of the communicants who will receive these transformed gifts with the hope of Heaven in their minds and hearts. The recession, our procession out into the world to carry out our services for God and one another in peace, reminds us of Christ's jubilant procession into Jerusalem. Knowing full well the obstacles He would face with His trial, rejection and crucifixion for our sins we, too are reminded of the obstacles we will face as we journey through life in His service. We also process to receive the sacraments of confirmation, matrimony and blessings such as at the Feast of St. Blaise and for the veneration of the cross on Good Friday. From the earliest days of Christianity the practice of processing the body of deceased loved ones from their place of death to the church and then to their final place of rest is still with us even as practiced with the modern automobile.

Processions differ from parades in that a parade is a show in motion where as a procession is a journey toward a destination.



The Sign of The Cross

One of the first gestures we make in the Mass is the sign of the cross signifying our belief in the triune God. The earliest Christians traced a cross on their foreheads with the thumb or finger, eventually this gave way to the use of two fingers. Either the thumb and forefinger or forefinger and middle finger symbolizing the two natures and wills of Jesus. Later in the East, three fingers were used to symbolize the three Persons of the Trinity. These early signs of the cross were small and first made on the forehead later including the practice of making the sign on the lips and different parts of the body as well as on objects; some with extended fingers, some with bent fingers and variations thereof. The number of times the sign was made also varied from as many as seven times and to as many as to the four parts of the body. This version of The Sign continued through the 11th century when the one larger sign we are familiar with today evolved. The Sign went from the right shoulder to the left, which is still maintained today in the Eastern Church. Archeological findings of sculptures and pictures reveal that both Eastern and Latin Christians used three extended fingers through the 12th and 13th centuries. St. John Chrysostum taught the Sign that we are accustomed to with the open hand beginning at the forehead to the breast then to the left and right shoulders. He taught that in thy blessing the Lord Jesus came down from

the head, which is the Father, into earth by His incarnation and from earth to the left side, that is Hell, by His bitter passion and from there into His Father's right side by His glorious Ascension.



Standing

Even without religious connotation, standing is a very powerful posture. Common references that we often use show the honor and dignity of standing, e.g. stand up for your rights, take a stand, stand up for what you believe, stand and be counted, stand with me, I'll stand by you, stand at attention, etc. etc. The first Christians were Jews and then, as in Christ's time as well as now, it is the custom of Jews to stand while praying whether it is in the Temple or at the Wailing Wall. In Matthew 6, Jesus makes reference to not being like the hypocrites who love to stand up and pray in the houses of worship and on street corners. In Luke 17: the Pharisee and the tax collector both stood to pray, one boastfully and one humbly but both stood in prayer.

Those of us old enough to remember the Latin Mass would know that it was time to stand when the priest sang. The priest's song was a call to prayer, "Oremus" or "Let us pray." We also stand in witness to the truth of the Gospel accounts, in honor when we take the vows of marriage, in dignity when we receive the sacraments, in respect when we greet the presider, ministers and servers, in reverence when we sing and in faith when we pray.

More to come in the next issue: kneeling, genuflecting and sitting.

We hope that you will save the date for this year's all new, re-vamped, Lawn Party. (July 13-15) To begin with, we took a vote and renamed the event St. Ann's Summer Festival. Next, we took the best from our old Lawn Partys, threw in lots of fresh, new events and came up with one heck of a family weekend! Some of the returning events are listed below. 

This year's **Memorial Day Mass** will be held on **Monday, May 28, at 10 a.m.** in our cemetery (weather permitting). Bring a chair for yourself and celebrate and honor our deceased veterans and all those resting in this sacred ground. In case of bad weather, Mass will be held in the church.

"Lord, for your faithful people, life has changed, not ended." When one enters a Catholic cemetery, like St. Ann's Cemetery, the church's teachings about life, death, and life after death should come to mind. Cemeteries are a part of our ritual space. In the Diocese of Springfield, there are some 50 Catholic cemeteries dating from the time of the first Catholic presence in Western Massachusetts. Whether diocesan or parochial, Catholic cemeteries in the Diocese of Springfield are service organizations. They seek to help people face the hard reality of death in the context of the promise of Eternal Life.

The people of St. Ann and St. Vincent de Paul parishes wish to thank Marcel Roux, and his staff, Tom Kirby, Dave Read, and Gene Lagonia, for all the work they do to make our cemetery so beautiful! As I write this for our April issue of The Goodnewsletter, I realize that I have been working on our cemetery records for about 3 years now. Over the last 100+ years, our cemetery cards were not kept up as accurately as they probably should have been. So, I have been trying to account for as many burials and as many plot owners as I can. I have been blessed with help from some extraordinary people in our parish. They have spend many, many hours logging in data, creating spreadsheets, talking up the need for better records, and more. After all is said and done, it really all comes down to one thing. I need everyone who is reading this article, to ask themselves if they own a plot, have family who owns a plot, or know of anyone in their family who has long since been buried in a plot at St. Ann Cemetery. If they answer yes to any of those questions, if they haven't already done so, I need them to complete the form on the next page with as much information as they know, and return it to the office. Even if it isn't your immediate family, fill a form out with what information you can. The information of who is buried in a plot is key to my project. I am cross checking all of our old cemetery cards against the new information that comes in, to be sure I can account for every grave and every person in our cemetery. I can't do it without your help, so please take a moment and complete the form on the next page. You can place it in the collection basket, mail it, drop it off, whatever works! I have extra forms if you need them. Thank you in advance for any help you can offer!

Have you heard about it? Have you been contacted about it? What is it, that would inspire a growing number of our parishioners to gather

Lessons Learned in 2011:

and not so well. Their key findings:

- ⇒ Planning began too late, with too few people involved.
- → We wore out our pastor (and several long-time participants).
- → We had "OK" financial results, but in some respects we missed the goal of an exciting familycentric event.
- → We need to reinvent the Lawn Party.

Inventing The Future:

The group evolved into a reinvention team, sharing ideas and collaborating on the outline for this year. Key themes are:

- → More family-friendly events on Saturday and Sunday.
- ➡ Enticing and welcoming Lenox visitors as never before.
- → Strengthening our financial results through addition of a Friday "casino night" event focused on fund raising.

The "Summer Festival" is Born:

A re-invention deserves a new name. After polling at Masses in December, the planning

> team chose "Summer Festival" as the name that best captures the blend of exciting. family-friendly celebration in the Berkshires we plan to achieve.

<u>Making It Real — Together:</u>

All of this involves a bigger scope than ever. The reinvention team believes the

key to success is to involve more parishioners in the Summer Festival, both in planning and during

the weekend itself.

By carving up the dozens of planning and coordination tasks formerly undertaken by one or two harried chairpeople, we can enlist more helpers who might each take on one or two tasks. The goal is for no one to feel burdened!

We Need You!

The plans are in place. We know

Last year, a young Hispanic man was at my brother's place of work, shivering from the cold, people were making fun of him. Carlos asked him, "Where is your coat?" He responded, "I don't own one." Carlos told the young man to meet him there the next day.

Lenox Triad: Help for Elders By Jan Chague

The Lenox Triad was formed in 2005 to prevent the victimization of our Lenox elders and promote their protection. Triad is a partnership with Lenox senior citizens, the Lenox Chief of Police and Fire Departments, the Berkshire County Sheriff's Office, the District Attorney's Office and the Director of the Lenox Council on Aging. These groups make up the Lenox Triad, which meets every other month from September through May with a Triad picnic in July for all Berkshire County Triad members.

At the Lenox Triad meeting, which starts at 9:30 a.m., each department of the partnership reports on any crime related incidents that would affect the elders of our Lenox community. Once the reports are given people have the opportunity to discuss the issues presented or other topics of concern. Recently some of the topics have been telephone scams such as the grandparent scam.

A person calls telling the grandparent that his or her grandchild has been in a serious accident and money needs to be wired immediately. This person relies on the shock of the message to instantly alarm the grandparent into action. Lenox Chief of Police encourages everyone to be alert and cautious on any suspicious calls received. Ask the person for a phone number so you can call back, while you check with your family about the accident. Most likely the person will hang up suspecting you are onto the scheme. Other scams are with people posing as contractors who will replace your roof or asphalt your driveway. Be vigilant, especially if they insist on money up front and tell you they will bring the contract back to you the next day when they start the work. If you give them the money you will probably never see them again. Just let them know you are not interested right now and send them on their way. Also call the Police Department to alert them to the possible scam.

Our Lenox elders have a wonderful resource in the Lenox Triad, which meets at the Lenox Community Center's living room. After the business part of the meeting there is usually a guest speaker at 10 a.m. During our last meeting we had Ned Roche, Funeral Director of the Roche Funeral Home who spoke on Funeral Planning. We have also had Margie Ware from Elder Services speak on Medicare.

Our upcoming meetings will be Marcia McKenzie, M.ED., Director, Diversity Initiatives and Western Massachusetts Alzheimer's Assoc., who will speak on Aspects of Alzheimer's. Marcia will be here on Monday May 14, 2012 at 10 a.m. On Friday May 18, 2012 Lenox Triad has a special meeting with Sheriff Tom Bowler, who will speak about his role as Berkshire County Sheriff and the Department's interaction within Berkshire County. All Berkshire County Triads, Council on Aging offices and the public are welcome to come to the Lenox Community Center at 9:30 a.m. for a morning of camaraderie and valuable information. The Dalton Triad has invited the Lenox Triad and the public to a special meeting on April 18, 2012 at 1 p.m. There will be representatives from the SMP (Senior Medicare Patrol) to discuss Medicare fraud and how to protect you from abuse. All the above programs are sure to raise awareness and be informative to all who attend.

Besides the Lenox Triad meetings there is the Yellow Dot Program. A yellow dot is placed on the upper left corner of the rear window to alert police if you are in an accident. The yellow dot means there is a packet of information about you in the glove compartment, which consists of your name, address, emergency contact, medications, and hospital of choice, your doctor, or a pet at home. This information helps the police know how to care for you if you are unconscious or unable to speak. It is a program that is easy to partake in. Anyone interested in participating in the Yellow Dot Program may call the Lenox Community Center at 413.637.5535.

The information you attain from a meeting could someday save you from being scammed, having a financial loss or placed in harm's way. Lenox Triad welcomes everyone to attend its meetings to find out about other ways to protect you and be safe.

After work Carlos went to Sears and asked the clerk there if they had a warm coat that was not too expensive. She said, "God is with you, we just mark this one down to half price and it is the last one we have."

The next day, Carlos brought the new coat to work and gave it to the young man who had been so cold. The young man took the coat and with tears in his eyes, said, "No one has ever been this nice to me." A year later, the young man came to see my brother and told him, "You changed my life. I'm a good person because of you."

I love my brother and my dream was to bring Ramito to this country and have them reunite. Carlos tried for a long time to find Ramito, but had lost contact and he couldn't locate him.

Ramito was a giant in my eyes, the way he protected my brother. They became best friends who swam together, ate together and played together. I pray he has survived in the hell Castro made of our beautiful island of Cuba.

Bullying cannot be tolerated even a little bit. Each of us can make a difference by not turning a blind eye to it. If you know someone who is a bully or who is being bullied, please tell a trusted adult who can stop the suffering of the one being bullied and just maybe make a positive change in the life of the one who feels the need to be a bully.
