Lenox, MA - - As part of the year-long Lenox 250th Celebration, *The Life and Times of Music Inn* will take place on August 25 3:00pm at The Mount in Lenox. The event will feature stories, video, audio tracks, memorabilia, and other Music Inn memories. Tickets are \$10 (free for The Mount members) and will mutually benefit The Mount and Music Inn Archives and its upcoming book project.

From 1950 – 1979, The Music Inn, situated just east of Tanglewood in the former barns and outbuildings of Wheatleigh, was home to a dynamic music scene that can rightfully be called legendary. It existed in several iterations, from the original Lenox School of Jazz to the Music Barn to Lenox Arts Center, and performance stages for those who were or would become music icons. Presenting performers, Louis Armstrong, Pete Seeger, and David Brubeck to Muddy Waters, The Band, Bob Dylan, Arlo Guthrie, The Kinks, Bruce Springsteen, Bob Marley and many, many more, Music Inn remains a piece of Lenox's heritage.

David Rothstein, who with partners Bob and Olga Weiss, took over the Music Inn in 1969, embarked on a mission in 2010 to capture the story and spirit of Music Inn that still resonates in a wide community of people who played, worked, and attended concerts there.

Rothstein enlisted Lee Everett, photographer/graphic designer, and Lynnette (Lucy) Najimy, multimedia producer, to research and build the <u>Music Inn Archives Website</u>. The website is a rich collection of articles, stories, images, live audio recordings, and memorabilia contributed by hundreds of people connected to Music Inn. In the 7 years since, there has been a steady stream of regards, stories, images, memories, and inquiries from people around the world, including media, publishers, and American music researchers.

In 2007 Ben Barenholtz, George Schuller, Benjamin Barber, Casey Meade, and others collaborated to produce <u>Music Inn, a documentary film</u>. The film has been highly requested and screened privately, but not yet been made available publicly.

Several Music Inn Reunions and Meet-ups have drawn folks from around the Berkshires and across the country. These included a Shenandoah Reunion in 2010 at Racebrook Lodge, a Good Friend Coyote concert at The Guthrie Center in 2012, a Jay and the Americans concert at the Colonial Theatre in 2014, several lively meet-ups at Bascom Lodge and around the County, and other gatherings.

As the enthusiasm and momentum for Music Inn show no signs of slowing down, the Lenox 250th Anniversary Committee invited The Music Inn to participate in its 2017 celebration. As a mutual benefit for The Mount

and Music Inn Archives, "The Life and Times of Music Inn" on August 25 at The Mount will include a remembrance of Benjamin Barber who was an active and enthusiastic contributor to the documentary film and to the Music Inn Archives until his death in 2016. His mother Stephanie founded and ran Music Inn in the 1960s.

The August 25 event will also mark the launch of the Music Inn Book Project, which will be a physical interpretation of the

digital archives including stories, clippings, memorabilia, and images from the three decades of Music Inn.

The organization seeks funders, volunteers, and content contributors to be involved in the upcoming book and encourages submissions of stories, memorabilia and photographs at www.musicinn.org, or Music Inn on Facebook.

Roman Catholic Apologetics - Praying to the Saints

One of my dear friends is, in her words, a "recovering Roman Catholic" who now identifies as an Evangelical Christian. Over the years we've had many spirited, far-ranging discussions regarding the tenets of the Catholic faith and our Church's specific teachings and practices. And while my friend undoubtedly was the victim of very poor catechesis as a youth, her questions have prompted me to regularly re-examine the reasons why we Catholics profess what we do – for a faith unexplored is a faith that quickly becomes stale and lifeless.

Her most frequent questions revolve around why Catholics pray to the Blessed Virgin Mary and other saints – in her view this practice is tantamount to worshiping them. In addition, she and many other Protestants view the practice of praying in front of statures that represent these saints as pure and unadulterated idolatry.

The fact that someone kneels before a statue to pray doesn't mean that they are praying to the statue, just as someone who kneels with a Bible in their hands to pray doesn't signify their worship of the Bible. Statues and paintings simply are a means to recall the person depicted. Just as it's easier to remember one's parents by looking at their photographs, so too it is easier to recall the lives of the saints and their individual merits by viewing representations of them.

For the record, while Catholics *venerate and honor* Mary as the mother of Jesus and also *honor* the other saints, we *do not* and *never* have adored or worshiped them. Adoration is the worship and homage due to God alone. The saints are human just like you and me – they are not divine. In fact, history tells us that saints more often than not are ordinary people who have achieved extraordinary things in their lives out of unqualified love and devotion to the Lord.

Further, Catholics understand and acknowledge that there is a powerful relationship between the Body of Christ already in heaven and those still on earth. Since the saints in heaven have no need of prayers, the intercessions to these saints are directed to those still on earth. As a result, praying to Mary and the Saints is akin to asking an intimate friend on earth to pray for us. Catholics believe that a saint in heaven living in the presence of Christ has a strong, direct connection to Jesus and their petitions on our behalf therefore are especially powerful.

Numerous verses in sacred scripture speak of prayers to the saints:

Revelation 5:8 states "and when he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell down before the Lamb, each holding a harp, and with golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints"

Further, Revelation 8:3-4 tells us "and another angel came and stood at the altar with a golden censer; and he was given much incense to mingle with the prayers of all the saints upon the golden altar before the throne; and the smoke of the incense".

Our faith tells us that we enjoy a profound connection with those alive in paradise, and that heaven and earth palpably intersect during the Mass. As a result, it is a completely natural and theologically – founded practice to offer up our prayers to Mary and her saintly cohorts.

"WHY DO YOU SPEAK TO THEM IN PARABLES?"

MATTHEW13:3-9, Mark 4: 3-9 & Luke 8: 5-8

Many of us have experienced the answer to this question during our own upbringing. Many parents and grandparents have used stories or situations that reflect or parallel natural situations that may be more familiar to a child in order to have them understand the results of their actions or a truth we may be less familiar with. Proverbs, a condensed form of a parable, are also common teaching tools used to raise a situation to an ideal or even spiritual level. Parables are also considered expanded proverbs. Parables are intended to appeal to the listener's curiosity and add to the listener's intelligence. Parables should engage listeners and move them to new ways of thinking about things as well as changing behaviors. Parables are not historical but are true to life and have perpetual significance. Parables, as opposed to fables, always have human characters and are always true to the natural world. Their message is clear and never secretive. Jesus always spoke the parables in Aramaic and these were handed down in written Hellenistic Greek. He often used different parables to deliver the same message, E.G. man's relationship to the world in the parables of the lost sheep and the sower of seeds, man's relationship with each other as in the prodigal son and the good Samaritan, the growth of the kingdom as in the mustard seed and the leaven of bread, the seeking of souls as in the lost coin and the lost sheep, etc. Parables also appear in the Old Testament as well as in Islamic writings, especially in Islamic mysticism. John's Gospel contains no parables.

"This is why I speak to them in parables, because they look but do not see, and hear but do not listen or understand." Matthew 13:13



Fall Bible Study Class






